

**Mrs. Chatfield of Boston Is Elected President Silver Foils**



**Peach Men Begin Fight on Curculio**

**First Application of Spray or Dust is Recommended for This Week**

Peaches should be given the first application of spray or dust when about 90 per cent of the petals have been shed. This week is the time to begin this application in this locality. Treat the late ripening varieties first and the other varieties as they are ready, says J. A. Harris, assistant entomologist in charge of the Peach Insect Laboratory at Aberdeen.

Curculios are beginning to come out of hibernation and go into the orchards. This application is made to poison these first beetles that enter the orchard. Most growers produced fruit last season that was relatively free of worms. The only way to produce the same kind of fruit this year is to pay strict attention to all control measures—namely spraying, picking up drops and jarring. In most orchards jarring can be confined to the outside rows, especially those rows adjacent to woods and places suitable for winter quarters for the curculio. Be thorough in the spraying and dusting operations and do not try to dust with a high wind blowing. Begin to make plans toward having the ground under trees clean when the drop comes.

Mr. Harris recommends 1 lb. arsenate of lead and 3 lbs. stone lime or 5 lbs. of hydrated lime to each 50 gallons of water. As a dust, either the 0-5-95 dust formula or the 80-5-15 dust formula.

Mr. Harris is for the present located in Aberdeen and will be glad to assist growers with their insect problems at any time.
