

Boston Milkman Wins \$25,000 Camel Award

Marine Captain's Wife Takes Second Prize of \$10,000—Two Tarheels Score

James Thomas Sharkey, 32, a milkman in Boston, was awarded the \$25,000 first prize in the \$50,000 nationwide contest for the best letter setting forth the advantages to smokers of the new moisture-proof cellophane wrapper on Camel cigarette packages, officials of R. J. Reynolds Tobacco company and the contest judges announced Wednesday. Sharkey lives at 101 Train street, Dorchester, Mass., a suburb of Boston.

Mrs. Walter Sweet, mother of three children and wife of a Marine Corps captain now stationed at the Brooklyn (N. Y.) Navy Yard, won the second prize of \$10,000.

Third prize of \$5,000 went to Julius M. Nolte, real estate dealer of

Duluth, Minn., and former secretary of the Duluth Commercial club.

In all thirty-eight prizes were awarded, of which five were for \$1,000 each, five were for \$500 each and twenty-five were for \$100 each. Judges of the contest were Roy Howard, Chairman of the Board of the Cripps-Howard league of newspapers; Charles Dana Gibson, famous artist and publisher of Life Magazine, and Ray Long, president of the International Magazine company and editor of Cosmopolitan.

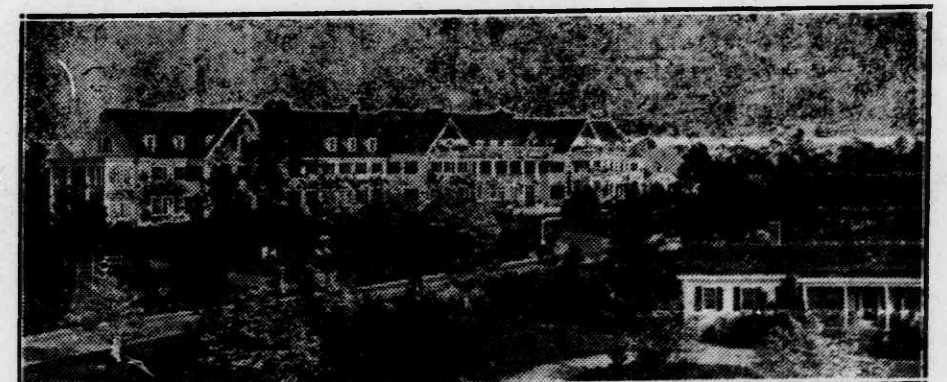
