Testing under the Ayrshire Herd Test plan, the ninety-four Ayrshires owned by Pinehurst Farm, Pinehurst, during March, secured the high production average of 708 pounds of 4.02% milk, 28.47 pounds of butterfat. Every cow in the herd that had once freshened was included in computing this average, regardless of age or stage of lactation, reports Advance Registry Superintendent W. A. Kyle of the National Ayrshire Breeders' Association.


