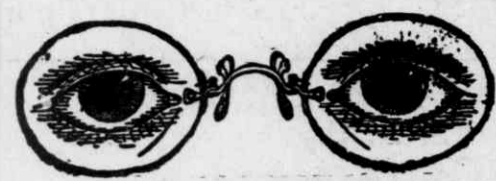

PINEHURST AYRSHIRES GET GOOD PRODUCTION RECORD

During June, the seventy-five Ayrshires owned by Pinehurst Farm, Pinehurst, secured the good production average of 676 pounds of 3.87 percent milk, 26.12 pounds of butterfat, under the Ayrshire Herd Test plan. Every cow in the herd had once freshened, regardless of age or stage of lactation, was included in computing this average, according to Advanced Registry Superintendent W. A. Kyle of the National Ayrshire Breeders' Association at Brandon, Vermont.

Individual honors in the herd were won by Maggie's Dream, an eight-year old which produced 1521 pounds

milk, 55.82 pounds butterfat; Pinehurst Favorite Queen, a seven year old which produced 1485 pounds milk, 55.24 pounds butterfat; M. C. C. Cinderella, a six year old which produced 1348 pounds milk, 54.86 pounds butterfat; and Premier's Violet of Pinehurst, a three year old which produced 1393 pounds milk, 45.27 pounds butterfat.

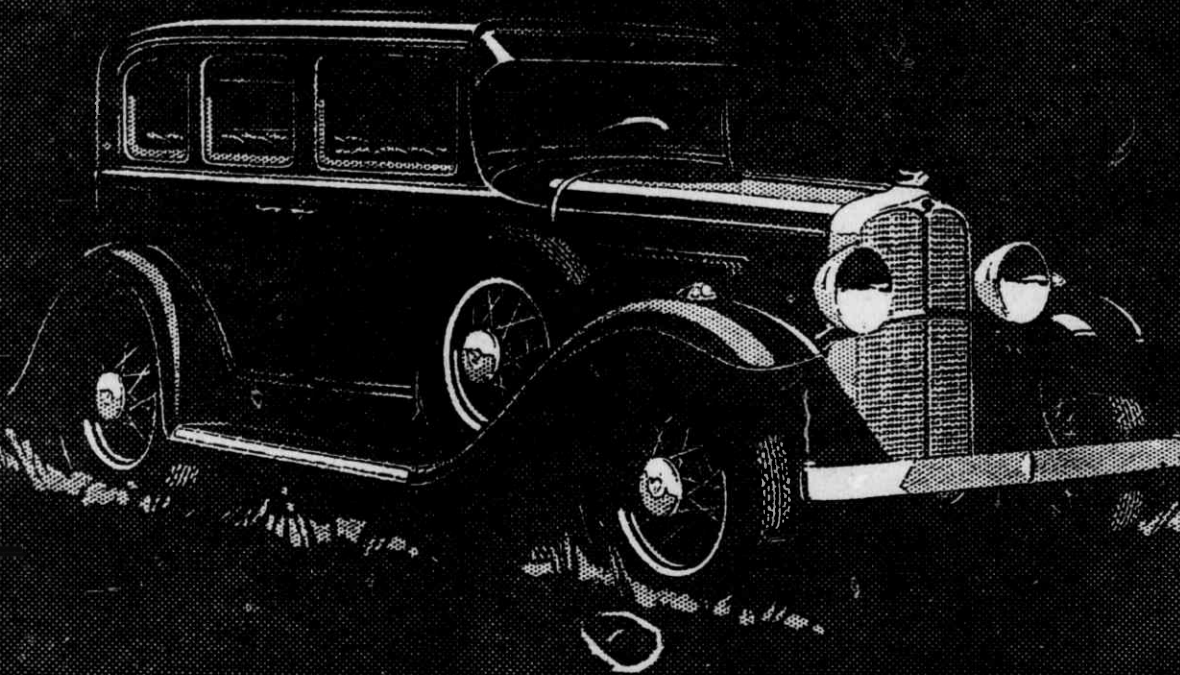
