### Theatre

There seems to be a trend, among the newer productions of Hollywood, toward simplicity and charm in talkie plots, a trend toward warm and appealing "heart interest." Eddie Dowling gives a splendid example of this seeming vogue in "Honeymoon Lane," his first picture since "The Rainbow," which comes to the Carolina Theatre this Thursday, Friday and Saturday. "Honeymoon Lane" is far, far removed from the blood-curdling or jazzy films of a few months ago. It is brimful with romantic fervor, seasoned with plenty of chuckles and outright laughs, and played by a brilliant cast of actors including Ray Dooley, Raymond Hatton, June Collyer, Corliss Palmer, Noah Beery, George Kotsanos, Ethel Wales, and Mary Carr. The story of how young love and faith calmly override the machinations of plotters, thugs and even ill circumstances. It's the romance of a young modern fellow and the girl of his heart. Her uncle, a gambling house operator, (Noah Beery) tries to break up the affair, but the faith of "Mother" Murphy, (Mary Carr) owner of a hotel which runs in opposition to the gambling house on lines of clean dealing, bolsters the lad's courage. Good luck takes a hand when a visiting monarch, incognito, seeks rest at "Mother" Murphy's—and just when things seemed darkest, fortune turns and the "lovers" and "Mother" win out.

An added attraction is Martinelli, of the Metropolitan Opera Company in two popular song numbers, "Love's Garden of Roses" and "Because."

In his second starring vehicle, "The Man In Possession," which comes to the Carolina Theatre, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Robert Montgomery is seen in the amusing role of a butler who eventually marries his mistress. This is Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's film version of the H. M. Harwood play which achieved considerable success both in London and on Broadway. The part is right up Montgomery's alley, affording him every opportunity for the sophisticated drolleries that made him one of the most popular players on the screen today. Somehow Montgomery can say and do things with an air of frank innocence, not to say naivety, that would possibly fall flat with suggestion coming from a less skilled player.

Miss Greenwood is a perfect running mate for Montgomery and their scenes together are among the highlights of the racy production. Irene Purcell, from the New York stage, plays the widow role with finesse, leaving nothing to be desired in her characterization.

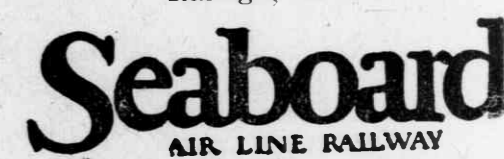
wanted by the manufacturer, what types bring him the best returns. So, cooperation in this respect really resolves itself into the grower raising, as near as possible, the types the manufacturers want, and giving some attention to grading, rather than depending on "hit or miss" methods. He knows that a pile of tobacco suitable for established brands of cigarettes, smoking and chewing tobacco bring him good prices, while unsuitable grades, especially the chaffy, light, bodiless lugs and leaf, cause the low average prices prevailing.
