## BIG INCREASE IN BUSINESS OF BUS LINES LAST YEAR

Some 6,000 motor bus companies operating in the United States during 1930 carried 1,784,000,000 passengers, an increase of 10,000,000 over the preceding year, "Bus Transportation" reports. Revenues from bus lines totaled \$326,000,000 against \$322,000,000 in rolling stock, terminals and garages rose to \$548,000,000, a gain of around \$46,000,000.
