

## YEOMANS PLEADS FOR SYSTEMATIC BEAUTIFICATION

Harmonious Scheme Should Be Followed in Planting of Trees and Shrubs SUGGESTS ORGANIZATION

The remarkable interest taken in the last two or three years in planting shrubbery in the Sandhills communities and the improvement on highway, street and lawn led A. B. Yeomans of Southern Pines to remark that if the citizens could form some sort of organization with an aim in mind something like that which impels the Park Commission of Southern Pines to function it would be a wholesome move.

"The people are planting so much more all the time that it is a pity it is not done more systematically," said Mr. Yeomans. "Every time a new lot of shrubbery is put out it ought to be done according to some systematic design, and not so much here and there a tree or shrub without regard for the other stuff around. That is the purpose of the Park Commission in Southern Pines—to keep in mind a harmonious scheme and to try to have each separate thing a harmonious grouping, and each particular lawn or bit of street front or bit of road fitting in with all the rest. Certain trees have certain effect on group planting, and by putting the various plants where they fit in with the rest of the scheme the effect is much better than where things are set promiscuously, without regard for anything else."

### Supervision Needed

This is better realized when Pinehurst as a whole is remembered. There Warren S. Manning prepared a general plan from the start, and as a result Pinehurst has been an ideal from the beginning, and steadily expanding along that original line. Southern Pines has come out amazingly under the direction of the Park Commission, but Mr. Yeomans thinks an organization that would have advisory influence over a wide territory, town and outside neighborhood included, could make this whole country a bit of outdoor life that would become famous as well as much more attractive as a place to live. With the excellent nurseries, Morell at Southern Pines, Kelly at the Pinehurst Nurseries, Deaton's and others in the vicinity, there is no dearth of material for any kind of planting or of skill in how to plant and handle the projects. Pinehurst and Knollwood are now governed by intelligent administration in this direction. Southern Pines is in the hands of the Park Commission, and if an organization that could recommend and encourage similar action in the outlying and in the private possessions Mr. Yeomans thinks infinite good would result.

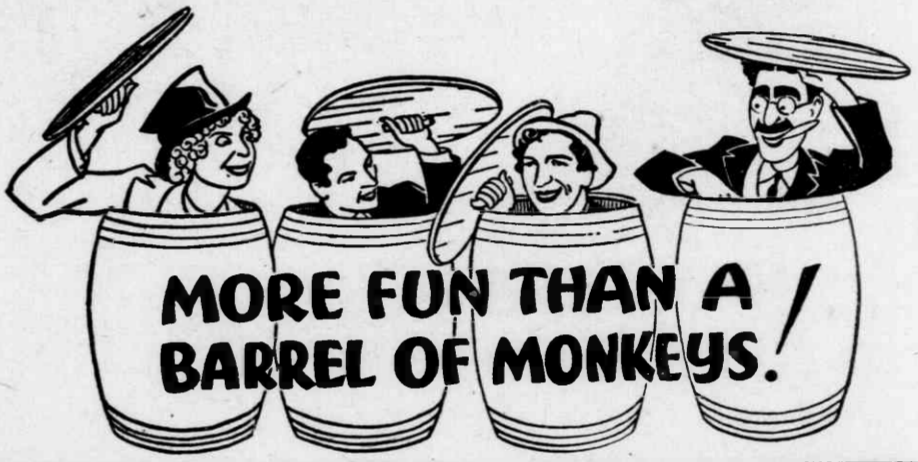
