

Popular Alumna of Pinehurst School Dies

Miss Lydia Sperber of Baltimore Passes Away at Moore County Hospital

The death of Miss Lydia Sperber of Baltimore, which occurred at the Moore County Hospital on Sunday afternoon, September 20th brought sorrow to her many friends in Pinehurst. She was in her seventeenth year and was a student in the Pinehurst schools in the year '29-'30, where she won a large place in the hearts of teachers and schoolmates by her sweet personality and unselfish disposition. In the long months of her illness the same patient, happy disposition characterized her life and endeared her to those with whom she came in contact to an unusual degree.

Surviving her are five sisters, one of whom is Miss Elsie Sperber, Superintendent of nurses at the Moore County Hospital, with whom she lived since coming to Pinehurst and who lavished upon her the love and care of a mother. At her bedside during the last illness was another sister, Miss Theo. Sperber, of Baltimore, who with Miss Elsie Sperber accompanied the remains to their former home in Baltimore where funeral arrangements were completed.

Moore County to Receive \$11,886 From School Tax Reduction Fund

Moore county will receive \$11,886.25 from the \$1,500,000 tax reduction fund to supplement local taxes to support the two months extended school term, over and above the constitutional six months term. The total cost of the extended term in this county, based on the standard established by the State for the six months term, will be \$26,299.74, the balance of which is to be paid from local taxes. The State Board of Equalization has found that the combined valuation of property in all the districts is \$2,737,024,233 and that a 14-cent tax rate is necessary to produce revenues sufficient to operate the two months terms, with the aid of the State's tax reduction fund. The total cost of the extended term, based on the standards fixed for the six months term, will be \$4,415,123, of which the State is to pay \$1,500,000, leaving \$2,915,123 to be paid by local taxes. It is seen from this that the State pays slightly more than one-third of the average total cost of the extended term, and in some cases it is more than half the cost.
