The dewberry crop is one that holds its own pretty well year after year, the acreage at the present being as big as it has ever reached. It has the advantage of being a little man's crop as well as a big man's, and one that brings its returns the year after planting instead of compelling several years of waiting before anything results.

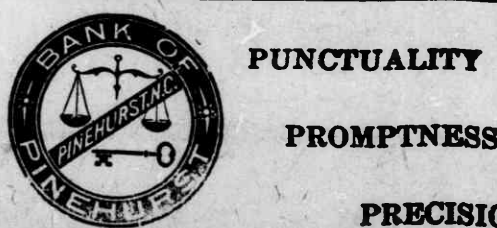
