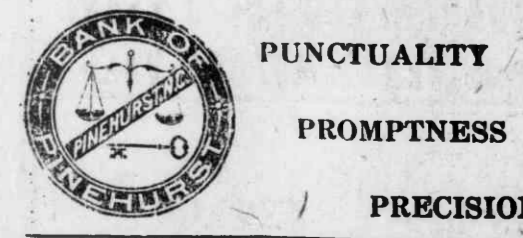

**VASS MERCANTILE COMPANY
 FILES BANKRUPTCY PETITION**

Voluntary petition in bankruptcy
 was filed in federal court Monday by
 the Vass Mercantile Company, Incor-
 porated, of Vass, following the adop-
 tion of a resolution by the stockhold-
 ers last Saturday. It is expected that
 the matter will be remanded to Ref-
 eree H. F. Seawell, Jr., of Carthage.

The schedule accompanying the pe-
 tition showed the corporation's in-
 debtedness to aggregate \$16,457, in-
 cluding \$10,989 in unsecured claims.
 The assets were listed at \$21,694, in-
 cluding \$7,099 in stock in trade and
 \$13,924 in open accounts.
