

# At the CAPITAL

Winner of the Ehringhaus-Maxwell-Fountain contest for the Democratic nomination for Governor will have as his opponent in the November general election Clifford Frazier, Greensboro attorney, nominated in the Republican State convention in Charlotte last week, unless some disgruntled G. O. P. member should file against Mr. Frazier and force him into a primary fight.

However, winner of the Morrison-Reynolds-Bowie-Grist fight for the U. S. Senate nomination is by no means certain he will have Jake F. Newell, Charlotte attorney, as his opponent in November, since George DePriest, former postmaster of Shelby and former Cleveland county Republican chairman, announces that he will oppose Mr. Newell and reaffirms that he will run, since the convention named the Charlotte attorney as candidate.

Surprise is expressed that Mr. Newell, so long a thorn in the flesh of the Republican "ins" was permitted the nomination, one explanation being that the Republicans, despairing of a national victory this fall, realized there would be no judgeships or other important posts soon, and decided to let Mr. Newell be "sacrificed and out of the way." Leaders also apparently were resigned to name Major George Butler, of Sampson, even though the Butler name has some of the characteristics of a red flag before a bull, until bank troubles involved him.

The Republican gathering was tame enough until John L. Morehead, son of a former congressman, suggested a referendum on liquor in a platform talk, and he was hissed and booed off the stage. The convention was strictly western, one man east of Durham, two east of Greensboro, made the ticket, which was nominated as follows: Governor, Clifford Frazier, Greensboro; U. S. Senate, Jake F. Newell, Charlotte; Lieutenant Governor, Brownlow Jackson, Hendersonville; Secretary of State, C. R. Grady, Conover; Auditor, S. S. Jennings, Lenoir; Treasurer, P. H. Gwyn, Leaksville; Supt. of Public Instruction, Holland Hilton, Durham; Attorney General, H. S. Williams, Concord; Commissioner of Agriculture, John M. Phelps, Creswell, Washington county; Insurance Commissioner, Wm. H. Grogan, Brevard; Corporation Commissioner, Virginia McClure, Haywood county; Presidential electors-at-large, Stuart W. Cramer, Charlotte and Walter Chambers, Marion.

Charles A. Jones, Lincolnton, accepted the 10th district congressional nomination and was re-elected national committeeman, and Mrs. Queen Bess Kennen, Farmington, was re-elected national committeewoman for North Carolina.

Special Judge John H. Harwood, Bryson City, was sentenced to jail, later changed to State's Prison, for one year and his daughter, Miss Lola Harwood, to State's Prison for two years, by Judge W. A. Devin in Wake Superior Court Friday after they had submitted, Miss Harwood to a charge of embezzling more than \$4,000 while clerk in the Revenue Department, and Judge Harwood to accessory after the fact and changing records.

The submission came after a jury had been empaneled and the case ready for trial, the charges being a misdemeanor as to Judge Harwood and a felony as to Miss Harwood, but with a lesser penalty than embezzling state funds, which, under a special statute, calls for longer imprisonment. The submission came as a surprise to onlookers, many believing there would be trouble in convicting Judge Harwood, at least, "beyond a reasonable doubt" on the evidence which was largely circumstantial. But the State was sure it would be sufficient.

Judge Harwood took the stand, saying he had considered himself a strong man, but when he found little hope for his daughter, his only child, he weakened in his desire to save her. He had served as assistant Attorney General and as a special judge several years, by appointment by Governor McLean and Gardner. He was suspended some weeks ago, without pay, at his own request, until the charges could be disposed of. The misdemeanor phase will not deprive him of his citizenship, as would have been the case had he submitted or been convicted of felony.

The North Carolina Corporation Commission, vested with additional authority by the 1931 General Assembly, has under contemplation a more thorough investigation of the investments of public utilities in the state, on which is based the authority for making rates that will bring a sufficient return on investments. Recent reports of 12 public utilities companies, gas and electric, show total valuations of \$362,817,611.23, on which earnings last year were \$29,502,080.

The commission has authority to investigate to see if the valuation of the property investments are justified thus justifying the rates charged for gas and electricity. There is no intimation that the values are far out of line. The commission may have trouble in securing sufficient funds for its investigation, during this period of cutting and restricting expenditures.

Race track betting, the State's election laws, the short ballot, taxation, bank failures, blind ordering of motion pictures, child labor on farms and other live subjects will be considered in special reports at the 20th annual meeting of the North Carolina Conference for Social Service at Durham April 24-26.

Reports prepared after special study include such subjects as Workmen's Compensation, by Prof. H. D. Wolf, U. N. C.; Tuberculosis, Dr. L. B. McBrayer; motor vehicle accidents, Prof. Harry Tucker, State College; marriage laws, Dr. W. L. Potat, Wake Forest; ordering motion pictures blindly, Mrs. Ada J. Davis, N. C. C. W.; race track betting, E. M. Perkins, U. N. C.; election laws, B. M. Perry, Henderson; short ballot, Robert Frazier, Greensboro; Social welfare and the money system, Dr. C. B. Hoover, Duke University preventing loss to bank depositors, Dr. J. B. Woolsey, U. N. C.; child labor on farms, Prof. C. H. Hamilton, State College; 55-hour work week for women, Prof. H. D. Wolf, U. N. C.

## SUMMER SCHOOL AT RED SPRINGS IS ANNOUNCED

A six-weeks summer school will be conducted at Red Springs by faculty members of Flora Macdonald College in the departments of Education, Psychology, Music, English, Latin, Social Science and Mathematics. Tutoring in high school or grammar grade subjects also will be offered.

As is usual with all summer classes, this may be coeducational. Teachers desiring to attend will receive certification credit from the State Department of Education. Since the courses offered will depend largely upon the number of students registering and their choice of subjects, early response is desired. 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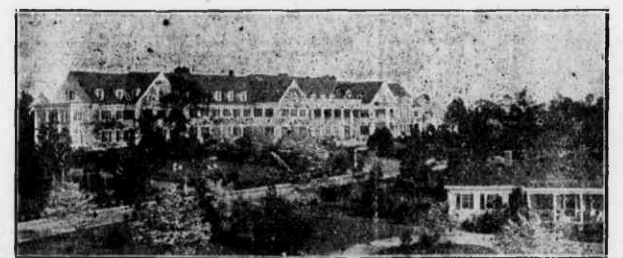
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
