P. Maples, and that the cost be paid one-half the ensuing May term of Moore county Superior Court.

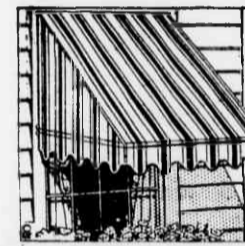
