

At the CAPITAL

The "beer" machinery bill, regulating sale, transportation and manufacture of 3.2 per cent beverages, was finally enacted last Thursday in time for May 1st thirsts, and the Revenue Dept. set about getting forms and blanks for license applications. The department announced that those who secure the municipal and county licenses, and make application for the State license, with the required \$5 fee, may proceed until the State license can be supplied, without it. Copies of the bill, 10,000 of them, will be printed and distributed as early as possible.

In addition to the provisions made for State institutions, other colleges and schools have been seeking through bills introduced to prevent the sale of beer and wine right at their doors. It will be prohibited in the town of Davidson College. Bills are in to prevent sale within a mile and a half of Guilford College and Oak Ridge Institute, and at Wake Forest and near Pineland Junior College. Other such bills will doubtless follow.

The omnibus board of education bill, naming boards in the 100 counties, was passed in the Senate, with only a few changes, and sent back to the House. But several hard fights have been enacted behind the scenes and a few reached the floor. Other fights may come to light in the House before it concurs. The J. P. omnibus bill has also passed the House and is now in the Senate.

The House, even though it still had half a hundred bills on its calendar, took the usual "local day" Saturday and most of its members went home. The Senate held a regular session Saturday in order to work on the Revenue Bill.

Only nine public bills were ratified the past week, but 81 local measures were disposed of, bringing the week's ratifications to 90. So far this session 910 bills have been ratified, probably 70 of them local. During the week 109 new bills were introduced, 28 in the Senate and 81 in the House, bringing the session's total to 2,089, and going above the total for the entire marathon 1931 session.

In addition to the beer machinery bill, seven others became law last week, as follows:

Making more effective regulation of public utilities; amendment to include neighborhood public roads in the provision for cartways, as provided in the 1931 laws; to limit the powers of the Commissioner of Banks in certain respects; amend the act on procedure to compel guardians to account; impose a privilege tax on those receiving compensation for permission to fish in streams stocked by the State; validate acts of county boards of education and commissioners relative to the assumption of school district debts by counties; to confine the sale of lime produced by convict labor to various State departments and subdivisions.
