POPULATION LOSS FEARED

The first effort to procure the permission of the State School Commission for a special election in the Southern Pines School District on the question of local taxpayers supplementing State funds to provide a nine months term in Southern Pines, one more month than provided by State funds, was launched on Wednesday of this week. A delegation representing the Town Board of Commissioners, the local School Board and the Chamber of Commerce conferred with the State body at Raleigh, but without results. Another conference will be held next week.

Those making the trip to Raleigh were Town Commissioner A. B. Yeomans, City Clerk Howard Burns and Frank Buchan, representing the town board; Ralph Chandler and Mrs. James Milliken representing the school board and President George Group May Petition for Referee G.
