**Calls Relief Director
in County Incompetent**

henceforth should be called bookkeeper—a noticeable decrease in authority. This was in direct opposition to Mrs. Campbell's promise.

I made no protest at this time other than informing the director that I had had no training as bookkeeper. I made every possible effort to cooperate with this new director even working on Sunday so that Miss Head would not have to make an extra trip from Chapel Hill. I also dispensed with two free afternoons a week which the other employees enjoyed to help this woman.

As an example of the spirit in which my efforts were received, I shall cite the following incident.

The director had been absent from the office two entire days, Monday and Tuesday, December 18 and 19. Late Tuesday afternoon, Dr. J. Symington and Mrs. Alice Watson (under whose care this case came) entered my office and told me that a negro relief case in Mrs. Watson's territory had to be transported the seventy miles to Duke Hospital by one o'clock the next day, Wednesday, December 20.

Miss Head had paid the county nurse, a case aid, and a caseworker from Relief funds for previous transportation of this same case.

One Relief Case
I offered to take the case myself, since on a previous trip the odor from the wound caused by a tubercular bone had made the driver ill. I did so on Wednesday, Dec. 20. The necessity for careful driving was evident and the trip consumed all of that day.

On Thursday when I returned to the office, Miss Head informed me of her intention not to reimburse me for this trip.

A great many influential people from all parts of the county have freely expressed their resentment at the importation of an utter stranger and their disapproval of the method in which the relief has been administered since her importation. So Miss Head has developed a jealous grudge against me because I still retain the favor of the people in Moore County.

Instead of cooperating with me she has thrust on me extra duties, such as posting, paying bills, checking C. W. A. projects, interviewing people, and furnishing her with reports—all this besides my regular duties as bookkeeper. When Miss Head is spending between \$8,000.00 and \$10,000.00 a month; this is a physical impossibility.

I am in receipt of a letter of De-

ember 28, which reads:
"Your dismissal as bookkeeper for the Moore County Relief Office becomes effective January 1, 1934, for inefficiency, disloyalty, and insubordination."

I emphatically deny the first and second charges; the third is an outright falsehood.

More than that I charge Miss Head with:

(1) Instructing me to enter salaries and travel of all case workers except one, as relief in the monthly report, thus making the apparent cost of administration about one half the actual amount.

(2) Incompetency. Miss Head read a long list of projects to the county engineer, and asked him to take charge of all these and have them completed in two months. The engineer promptly informed Miss Head that not only did she not know what she was talking about, but also that it would take five engineers twice as long to complete these projects.

(3) Showing unjust favoritism—particularly noticeable in the case of Mrs. J. B. Swett, of Southern Pines, case worker and close friend of Miss Head. Mrs. Swett has been authorized by Miss Head to write twice as many orders for her district as the total number of orders turned in by four other case workers in the county. This fact has been verified by actual comparison.

(4) Assigning me humanly impossible duties, the failure of the performance of these duties to serve as an excuse to release me from my position and thus satisfy a personal grudge.

(5) Playing politics.

I have kept faith with you, the merchants and citizens of this county, and I appeal to you in the name of justice, fairness, and honesty, can you let this outrage continue unheeded?
