

Light Civil Docket in Superior Court

Three Judgments Awarded Monday by Judge Shaw.—Many Cases Continued

Superior Court for the trial of civil cases convened in Carthage on Monday with Emergency Judge Thomas J. Shaw presiding. Judge Shaw was commissioned by Governor Ehringhaus to hold this court due to a conflict in the district which made it impossible for Judge H. Hoyle Sink to be in this county.

The lightest docket of recent years faced the court and around a fourth of these cases were continued on the opening day. The following judgments were ordered on Monday:

G. Ober & Sons versus R. C. and M. G. Dalrymple: Ordered that the plaintiff recover judgment of the defendant R. C. Dalrymple in the sum of \$310.69 with interest from June 2, 1924 until paid, together with the cost of the action.

Joseph Levey vs. A. L. Luff, defendant, and Page Trust Co., garnishee: ordered that plaintiff recover judgment of the defendant in the sum of \$276.63.

H. W. Dorn, Trading as Vermont Market, vs. Mrs. Florence M. Deacon: The judgment of the magistrate's court was affirmed and it was ordered that the defendant pay the cost of the action. It was further ordered by consent of the parties that execution shall not issue on the judgment until May 1, 1934.

Rassie Wicker Would Have Survey of County Line Done Thoroughly

Appropriation of \$50.00 Not Enough For Properly Making Moore-Hoke Boundary

Rassie E. Wicker notes that the county commissioners have planned to have the Hoke-Moore county line definitely marked, and offers the suggestion that while the job is being done it be done thoroughly and says that if not more than \$50 is available to do it, more money should be gathered up so that the line can be tied in with the government survey that has laid down a positive line from Savannah to Norfolk, following the Seaboard railroad, passing through the east side of Moore county.

He might have gone further and emphasized his proposition with the statement that when Fort Bragg was established Capt. McNaid with a corps of government surveyors from the Geodetic Survey, made a complete job of precise survey of the entire area covered by Fort Bragg and tied the work in with the geological survey which covers the east and the north side of the county, so that Moore is one of the best surveyed counties of the United States and one of the best marked with absolutely precise permanent stone and iron monuments sprinkled over all the territory covered. These lines tie in with all the big government lines reaching from ocean to ocean and from the lakes to the gulf.

The county line is already surveyed and marked with stone and iron monuments from the Aberdeen-Rae road to a point on the county line where the Fort Bragg boundary crosses James Creek. A monument is near that point, and north from there are other monuments, as well as south from the Aberdeen road with which the line can be checked and tied in. It is Mr. Wicker's suggestion that from the south end of the Fort Bragg boundary line a positive line should be run to the extreme corner of Moore with Scotland, and from the north end of the line to the north corner where Moore joins Harnett county. At points along the line he advises monuments, just as on the government surveys, each monument so marked that its precise latitude, longitude and elevation can be learned at any time by any surveyor for any future uses, and the information registered in one of the offices at the Courthouse at Carthage as a basis for any further needs regarding information for surveyors and property owners in the vicinity of the line. Then when new surveys of lands are made or old surveys are revised they could be tied in with the latitude and longitude of the monuments, which would afford permanent marks as long as land lines are needed.

Suggests Route

Mr. Wicker suggests that the surveyors take the most northerly monument on the Fort Bragg-Moore county line, and from there run a line as direct as conditions will permit to the Harnett and Moore county line, and the same way from the south end of the Fort Bragg line to the Scotland line. The course of the line as determined by the government surveyors in the area of the camp is 38 degrees and 30 minutes east of north, but with two slight variations in the line, for it is not straight.

The work done by the government surveyors is not dependent on the needle, but when the lines were run the transit men every night checked up on their accuracy on the pole star, figuring the daily variation of the star, so that the line is accurate to the fraction of an inch in long distances. The expectation is that a line of twenty miles will be accurate within less than a foot, and if in a verification of a survey the limit of

Surveyors could check their instrument by the county line, and know the variation of their needles. The monuments would be bench marks from which every farm could be located and the value of such a scheme would be life-long and without compare. Mr. Wicker will submit his suggestion to the commissioners.

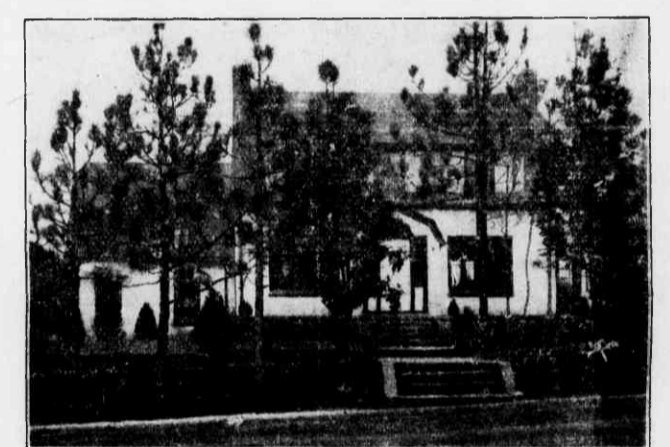
