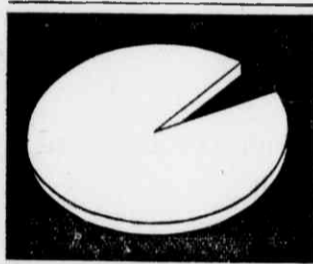

North Carolina Tobacco Brings Highest Prices Since 1929 Crop

Estimate of 1933 Average is \$16.10, With Crop Value Exceeding 80 Million Dollars

North Carolina sold its 1933 tobacco crop for the highest price since 1929.

Official figures made public this week by the State-Federal Crop Reporting Service placed the average price at \$16.10. The 1929 average was \$18.30.

The 1933 crop, although not entirely marketed, was given an estimated total value of \$83,553,000, a gain of \$48,290,000 over the \$35,273,000 realized from the 1932 crop.

With 509,060,354 pounds of the estimated 1933 production of 518,522,000 pounds marketed through January, the crop already has brought in approximately \$81,296,000, the report revealed.

The average price paid through January was \$15.97 a hundred, as compared with \$12.03 for the 1932 crop marketed through the same period a year ago. The report estimated the yearly average for 1933 would be \$16.10 a hundred as compared with \$12 the previous year.

January sales in Aberdeen totaled 94,300 pounds at an average price of \$18.09 a hundred. Carthage did not report any sales during last month.

The estimated 1933 production represented an increase of 76.5 per cent over the 1932 crop which totaled 293,694,000 pounds, the report said. This tremendous gain was attributed in the main to a 43 per cent increase in acreage planted and a marked improvement in the yield per acre.

The estimated yield an acre was placed at 770 pounds, which was 146 pounds an acre more than the previous season.

Market sales during January were unusually active this season, the report declared. Producers' sales last month totaled 36,437,492 pounds at an average of \$14.31 a hundred, compared with only 13,007 last year at an average of \$8.67.

County's \$36,000 Loan For Schools Approved

Executive Committee of Local Government Commission Passes Application

The executive committee of the Local Government Commission in Raleigh this week approved the application of the Moore County Board of Commissioners to borrow the sum of \$136,000 by sale of bonds to the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, according to a special report to The Pilot this week from Raleigh.

This loan is for the construction of new school buildings and additions at Carthage, Sheffield, High Falls, Bensalem, Eureka, Southern Pines and Aberdeen.

The approval of the commission's executive committee is believed to be tantamount to approval by the commission as a whole, and it is probable that within the next week the application will have been acted upon by the Public Works Administration in Washington. The coming of spring is expected to see the start of the work on the various buildings.

STACK ENDORSED

Furthermore, we wish to state that Judge Stack is a tried and sympathetic friend of our ex-soldiers and understands their point of view. Some members of his own family saw service in the World War, and when in his judicial career occasion has arisen, all other material circumstances permitting, Judge Stack, has both in judgments and appointments, consistently recognized the meritorious claims of worthy Veterans.

We, therefore, present Judge Stack to the Thirteenth Judicial District Democracy for renomination.
