The program calls for the placing of families with knowledge of farming on any available lands to be secured on the following terms: by cleaning up land for its use for an agreed period; by ditching land; by repairing buildings, fences, etc or by paying a share of the crop as rent. Under the landlord's and tenant's agreement the landlord agrees that he will take no part of the tenant's share of the crop for back debts or any other obligations than those specified in the agreement. Tenant farmers who receive supplies from the government will be required to work to pay for same. Landlords who have land which could be used in this rehabilitation program but whose tenant houses are not in habitable condition can have the same repaired without cost to them for labor if they will furnish the necessary materials for the work. Carpenters on the relief will be sent from place to place to do this work, according to the plan. Wherever possible relief families will be aided in making arrange. ments with landlords that will take said families immediately and permanently off relief.
