## County Commissioners Adopt Moore-Hoke County Boundary

### Bailey Survey Recorded With Register of Deeds.—Other News of Board

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday with all members present except E. C. Matheson, who has been ill for some time. The Board voted to express its best wishes to Mr. Matheson for a speedy recovery and an early resumption of his duties with the Board.

It was ordered that the map of the county line between Moore and Hoke counties prepared by M. McQ. Bailey, county surveyor, be probated and filed and recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds.

The office of constable of Mineral Springs township, to which Robert L. Pratt was heretofore appointed, was declared vacant as Pratt has moved from the county, and his bondsmen relieved of any further responsibility.

It was ordered that the county accountant transfer the sum of \$1000 from the contingent fund to the poor fund.

The chairman of the board, the county attorney and the county accountant were authorized to make a settlement and adjustment of taxes of the Carthage Furniture and Manufacturing Company, Wilson Furniture and Manufacturing Company and the Union Furniture and Manufacturing Company with the Referee in Bankruptcy, H. F. Seawell, Jr.

Curtis McGregor and Willie Hilliard were relieved of poll tax on account of disability.

It was ordered that an order be placed with the N. C. Coal Mining Company for 50 tons of lump coal delivered in bins at the court house, jail and county home at a price of \$4.50, not to be paid until after July 1.

Money for support was granted as follows: Mary Henderson, colored, of McNeill township, \$5 per month for May and June and \$4 thereafter; Mrs. Ralph Williams \$8 per month for May, June and July for self and children; Mrs. Lacy Faircloth, West End, Route 1, \$5 per month until further order.
