Many Loans Made To Farmers of Section

Total of \$142,528 Borrowed for Crop Production in Moore and Adjacent Counties

Farmers of Moore, Lee and Montgomery and Richmond counties borrowed a total of \$142,528.75 from January 1 up until the first of this month, according to figures released by the Farm Credit administration of Columbia. The loans were made to a total of 595 farmers, the average oan being \$293.54.

In the four states served by the Farm Credit administration-North and South Carolina. Georgia and Florida-over \$7,000,000 was borrowed by 28,120 farmers. An additional \$450,000 is being advanced to farmers who are obtaining their loans in a series of installments during the

The spring seasonal demand for crop production loans has now passed its peak and a larger proportion of the farmers borrowing from the association are obtaining loans for general agricultural purposes, such as for purchasing work-stock, equipment and machinery, and for financrepairs and improvements. The trend toward general purpose loans is reflected in the gradual increase in the size of the average loan.

Farmers borrowing from these newly organized, short-term credit institutions partially owned and operated by the borrowers, are effecting a considerable saving on interest charges, which are at the rate of five per cent a year, charged on an annual basis and collected at ma-The Thursday Afternoon Book turity of the loan.
