necessary to retire it on the county wide plan is \$16,993.18 or \$11,627.10 more than on the district plan.

Cameron

The outstanding indebtedness of the Cameron District maturing after June 30, 1934 is \$42,000. The valuation for 1933 was \$576,003 or 2.8662 per cent of the county total. The total requirements necessary to retire this indebtedness on the district plan is \$67,515 or, on the county wide plan, \$27,304.55, or \$40,210.45 less on the county wide plan.

Vass-Lakeview

The outstanding indebtedness of the Vass-Lakeview district maturing after June 30, 1934 is \$43,100. The property valuation in 1933 is \$846,000. Or 4.2098 per cent of the total county. The total tax requirements necessary to retire this old indebtedness is \$68,672. There is no proposed indebtedness. The total tax requirements necessary to retire this indebtedness on the district plan is \$68,672, or on the county wide plan \$40,104.21, or \$28,567.19 less on the county wide plan.

Carthage

The outstanding district indebtedness of Carthage District maturing after June 30, 1934 is \$72,875. The 1933 valuation is \$1,204,195 or 5.9922 per cent of the county total. The total tax requirements necessary to retire this old debt is \$107,927.48. The proposed indebtedness for new building and rooms is \$34,550. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old debt plus the proposed indebtedness on the district plan is \$149,104.45. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old plus the proposed indebtedness on the county wide plan is \$57,084.05, or \$92,020.40 less than on the district plan.

Aberdeen

The outstanding district indebtedness of the Aberdeen district maturing after June 30, 1934 is \$84,000. The 1933 property valuation is \$2,461,777 or 12.2475 per cent of the county total. The total tax requirements necessary to retire this old indebtedness is \$119,595. The proposed indebtedness for new buildings is \$36,050. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old plus the proposed indebtedness on the district plan (if the district plan of repaying proposed indebtedness were possible) is \$162,602.17. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old plus the proposed indebtedness on the county wide plan is \$116,674.50 or \$45,927.61 less than on the district plan.

West End

The outstanding district indebtedness of the West End District maturing after June 30, 1934 is \$23,911. The property valuation is \$715,633 or 3.5610 per cent of the county valuation. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old indebtedness is \$28,938.33. The proposed indebtedness for new rooms is \$13,200. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old plus the proposed indebtedness on the district plan (if district plan of repaying proposed indebtedness were possible) is \$45,042.33. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old plus the proposed indebtedness on the county wide plan is \$33,923.48 or \$11,118.85 less than on the district plan.

Eureka

The outstanding district indebtedness of the Eureka district maturing after June 30, 1934 is \$2,250. The property valuation is \$420,575 or 2.0928 per cent of the county total. The tax requirements necessary to retire the old indebtedness is \$2,665. The proposed indebtedness is \$34,000 for a new building. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old plus the proposed indebtedness on the district plan (if district plan of repaying indebtedness were possible) is \$42,850.51. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old plus the proposed indebtedness on the county wide plan is \$19,936.83 or \$22,913.68 less than on the district plan.

Hemp

According to a statement recently furnished by our county auditor, Mr. John C. Muse, the outstanding district indebtedness of the Hemp district maturing after June 30, 1934 is \$21,000, and its property valuation for the year 1933, \$518,029. The valuation is 2.5778 per cent of the county's \$20,006,146. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old debt is \$26,801.30. The proposed indebtedness for new rooms is \$13,200.

The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old indebtedness plus the new or proposed indebtedness on the district plan (if district plan of repaying proposed indebtedness were possible) is \$42,905.30. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old plus the proposed indebtedness,

Eagle Springs

The outstanding district indebtedness of the Eagle Springs district maturing after June 30, 1934 is \$2,250 and the total property valuation in 1933 is \$263,818 or 1.3128 per cent of the county valuation. The total tax requirements necessary to retire this old indebtedness is \$2,655. The proposed indebtedness for new building is \$34,000. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old indebtedness plus the proposed indebtedness on the district plan (if district plan of repaying proposed indebtedness were possible) is \$42,850.51. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old plus the proposed indebtedness on the county wide plan is \$12,506.25 or \$30,344.26 less than on the district plan.

Non-Existing Special Tax District Area

The nonexisting special district area of the county had a property valuation of \$3,822,581 in 1933 or 19.0214 per cent of the county total valuation. The proposed indebtedness for this area is \$68,000. The total tax requirements necessary to retire this proposed indebtedness on the district plan is \$80,391.02. The total tax requirements necessary to retire it on the county wide plan is \$181,205.34, or \$100,814.32 more than on the district plan.

Summary

The outstanding school indebtedness of Moore County and all its districts maturing after June 30, 1934 is \$443,325, and the 1933 county valuation \$20,096,146. The total tax requirements necessary to retire this past indebtedness, including both principal and interest, is \$610,259.28. The proposed indebtedness for new school buildings is \$287,500 less the \$65,500 grant of the federal government, or \$222,000 in principal to be repaid. The total tax requirements necessary to retire the old plus the proposed school indebtedness of the county and its districts either on the district plan or the county wide plan is \$952,639.28.
