Check Behind Your Dealer, Says Official

Consumers Being "Gypped" by Short-Weight and Short-Measure Says Baucom

Many consumers in North Carolina are being "gypped" out of considerable sums annually by unscrupulous dealers who short-weight or shortmeasure what they buy, simply because the purchasers do not check often behind them, states C. D. Baucom, in charge of weights and measures laws for the Department of Agri-

Mr. Baucom reports that recently he stopped a load of bread to find that the loaves were plainly marked 16 ounces, but in reality weighed only 14 ounces. Under threat of prosecution, he required the truck to turn back and properly label the bread. Much could be saved by frequent weighing and measuring behind dealers, and reporting when short Mr. Baucom states.
