the class of 1898. He obtained his degree in law at the University of North Carolina in 1900. He went at once to his home town and began the practice of law. For six years he was Mayor of Carthage before his appointment to the Recorder's Court.

Mr. Humber was united in marriage to Miss Florence Ackiss of Norfolk, Va., and to them were born two children, a daughter and a son, both of whom were with him almost constantly during his last illness. They are Mrs. Carl Reid of Baltimore, Md., and Sam Humber, who is this year a senior at the University of Missouri. Other survivors are four sisters, Mrs. J. E. Waddill, Mrs. R. H. Shields and Mrs. Walter Williamson, all of Carthage, and Mrs. T. B. King of Hamlet.

The funeral service was held in the Carthage Methodist Church at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning conducted by the pastor, the Rev. E. C. Durham, assisted by the Rev. W. S. Golden, Presbyterian minister of Carthage. Mr. Golden, for a number of years a friend of the deceased, gave in his prayer a beautiful word-picture of "Judge Humber," as he was known to the Moore county citizenry, mentioning a number of the characteristics which had won for him the place which he held in the hearts of the people.
