News of the Week

In State and Nation as Gleaned from Telegraph Reports and Daily Papers

Bruno Hauptmann, a German carpenter, arrested on suspicion of implication in the Lindbergh kidnaping after passing gold certificates identified as part of ransom money paid unknown man at cemetery near Lindbergh home by Dr. Condon, known as "Jafsie." Nearly \$15,000 in other ransom notes located in Hauptmann garage. Federal officials believe crime now nearing solution.

General Hugh S. Johnson's resignation as head of the National Recovery Act accepted by President Roosevelt on Tuesday. The President returned to Washington from his Hyde Park, New York home to take personal charge of NRA.

Walter P. Stacy, chief justice of the North Carolina Supreme Court, named by President Roosevelt head of board of three to "adjust the recurring labor controversies of the textile industry."

Big textile strike ended last week but many problems yet to be ironed out.

America's cup defender, Rainbow, sailed by Harold S. Vanderbilt, won its fourth race against the British challenger, Endeavor, sailed by T. O. M. Sopwith, keeping the famous trophy on this side of the Atlantic. The Endeavor won the first two races.

Detroit won the American League pennant; New York and St. Louis in a virtual tie for the lead in the National League with the season ending next week.

TEACHERS BETTER TRAINED NOW, STATE RECORDS SHOW

White teachers in North Carolina public schools last year had been trained in colleges an aggregate of approximately 60,000 years, or an average of 3.28 years for each of the approximately 18,000 teachers, figures compiled in the office of State Superintendent A. T. Allen show.

White teachers last year had 3.28 years of college training, ten years ago the average college training was only 1.524 years, which shows that, in spite of the depression for four or five years and the greatly reduced salaries, last year especially, they had increased their college training an average of about one and two-thirds years in the 10-year period.

Moore county's white teachers had 3.163 years of college training last year, as compared with 1.519 years 10 years ago. Southern Pines city unit white teachers had 3.8 years of training last year and 3.091 years in college on the average 10 years ago.
