Important Notice to Delinquent Taxpayers

The law is mandatory upon the County Commissioners that foreclosure proceedings on all tax sale certificates for the years 1927, 1928, 1929, 1930 and 1931 be instituted not later than Oct. 1, 1934. The Commissioners have no discretion in the matter and the certificates have been turned over to the County Attorney with instructions to proceed. There are a great many who have not paid their taxes for the years 1930 and 1931, and others who are delinquent for all of said years. Some have made partial payments.

Persons who have purchased property in the past few years should investigate as to whether back taxes have been paid by former owner, since property is liable for back taxes. The same is true of holders of mortgages on real estate.

The Commissioners do not wish that any tax-payer shall be additionally burdened with court costs. Therefore, it is imperative that settlement be immediately arranged with the County Accountant at her office in the court house.
