Start Work on Fire **Observation Tower Here**

Steel Structure Will Rise 75 Feet Above Hill Near Mount Hope Cemetery

On the top of the hill adjoining M Hope Cemetery west of Southern Pines a group of CCC men are now engaged in building the observation tower for the forestry service. The material is on the ground to provide a handsome steel tower almost 7 feet from ground to the coping of the roof. It will be about 25 feet or the square at the bottom, with an enclosed cabin at the top equipped with observation instruments to locate fires or other undesirable conditions in any direction, and with a series of cross sections to enable the observer to determine the exact po-

> The location is not only highly picturesque, but it gives a commanding view of the country for miles in all directions. Protests at Profanity in Presence of Girls and Man Draws Knife

Robert Gifford, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Gifford of Southern Pines, is in the infirmary at Louisburg College in Louisburg as the result of a trying experience at the Franklin County Fair last week. According to information received by his father from President Armour David Wilcox of Louisburg College, "Bob," while at the fair with a number of other students, among them several girls, was approached by a drunken man who began using profane and obscene language in the presence of ladies. The man struck him and young Gifford knocked him down.

While the man was on his knees he drew a knife and struck "Bob" across the leg about six inches above the knee, making a deep gash about four or five Inches long across the muscle of the leg. His friends rushed him to a doctor's office nearby where the wound was sewed up.
