**FATHER OF H. C. McLEOD OF
OF SOUTHERN PINES PASSES**

Funeral services for J. F. McLeod, who died in Raleigh last Thursday morning in Rex Hospital were held Friday afternoon at the Baptist Church in Buie's Creek. Interment was in the Neill's Creek Baptist church. He was the father of H. C. McLeod of Southern Pines.

Mr. McLeod for years a leader in the Harnett county Republican party, was 76 years old. He was interested in education and was credited with assisting the late Dr. J. A. Campbell in establishing Buie's Creek Academy, now Campbell College. He was born in Neill's Creek Township and was by occupation a farmer.
