## Noel Laing Rides Old **Trouble Maker to Win**

Horse Trained Here and Considered "Through" Tops Big Field in Jersey Cup

"Trouble Maker," the steeplechase horse trained in Southern Pines by Noel Laing and ridden by him to victory in the Maryland Hunt Cup anl other American classics and to glory if not victory in the British Grand National, proved himself far from "through" at Far Hills, N. J., last Saturday afternoon, winning the New Jersey Hunt Cup over one of the best fields of the year. Young Laing was in the saddle.
