gences; the remaining fifty cents is divided between the Branch County Chairmen and a National County Fund, two-thirds to the Branch County Chairmen, one-third to the National County Fund. The County Fund is held over until the following autumn to be used in whatever main charitable project the county may have in mind. So everywhere, and in all ways, the Red Cross is at work.

This year the main project of Moore county is to engage a county nurse who, besides her regular duties, will start a campaign for home nursing and conduct classes in home nursing, and anyone who knows anything at all of Moore county will recognize the imperative necessity for such work.

So do not, even if by chance the Red Cross solicitor fails to find you, fail yourself to send in your membership. Financial disaster is not as near to us as it was a year ago; not nearly so near as it was two years ago; and therefore more people can afford to become members of the Red Cross. But every other form of disaster is still fairly constant, and its most stalwart enemy is the dollar you subscribe.
