### **Fingerprints Solve** Wiley House Theft

### George Hill Admits Entering Southern Pines Home During Past Summer

By means of the fingerprint service maintained by the sheriff's office in Moore county, the Wiley house robbery in Southern Pines which occurred last summer and which involved some seven or eight hundred dollars' worth of jewelry has been solved. Finger-print Expert Lawrence Kelly obtain-ed prints from a wall in the home and the pictures were filed in the sheriff's office.

Recently, when George Hill was arrested for breaking and entering a number of Sandhills homes which had been closed for the summer, his fingerprints were taken, and a checkup revealed that they were identical with those found in the Wiley home. In court last week, Hill pleaded guilty to all charges against him except that of breaking and entering the Wiley house, but, according to Mr. Kelly, who has since then confronted him with the fingerprints, Hill has admitted going into this house. The jewelry has not been recovered.
