For All Good Men To File Their State Income Tax Returns

A deputy commissioner of the State Department of Revenue, John Thomas, will be in the office of the Register of Deeds in Carthage tomorrow, Saturday, and Monday for the purpose of assisting taxpayers in filing their State income tax returns.

If you are an unmarried person and have an income of \$1,000 during the year 1934, or a married person and had an income of \$2,000, you should file a return with the State Revenue Department on or before March 15th. If you need aid in the preparation of the return, Mr. Thomas will assist you.
