"Evensong," the attraction at the Pinehurst Theatre, Wednesday, March 6th, matinee and night, presents in its leading role that glamorous artist of the stage and screen, the lovely, ash-blond Evelyn Laye. It seems quite fitting that Miss Laye, who has herself figured so conspicuously in operetta successes, should be chosen to carry the role of Irela, the operatic tar who turned her back on love in order to follow the call of her career.
