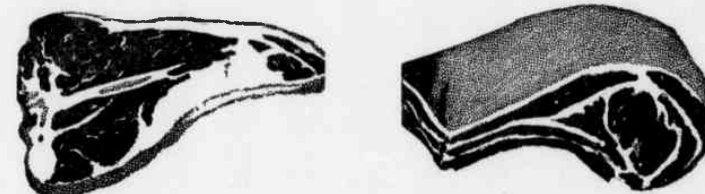

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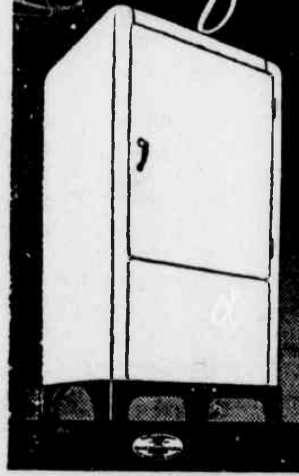

GODDARD HOME IN NIAGARA IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

The Southern Pines chemical apparatus responded to a call for assistance from Niagara shortly before noon Saturday, but found upon arrival the home of Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Goddard consumed, with all its con-

tents, the occupants escaping without saving anything. The flames enveloping the frame structure within a few moments after discovery. Mrs. Goddard, the former Mrs. Fred Chatfield, was formerly a resident of Southern Pines, having been one of the pioneer settlers here.
