# Farmers Can Save Thousands by Control of Tobacco Worms

Timely Information on How to Combat Pests Which Cause Heavy Damage Each Year

Tobacco worms are well known pests to North Carolina tobacco Smith, H. D. Tally and S. D. Walker growers. There are two kinds of worms responsible for the damage as most growers well know: (1) The Horn Worm. The pests cause many week. thousands of dollars damage to the tobacco crop each year and growers should make every effort to control these insects.
