

### Ask N. C. To Take Over Juniper Lake Road

**County Commissioners Also Seek Collection of Court Costs and Fines**

The County Commissioners at their meeting on Monday voted to recommend that the State Highway Commission take over and maintain the road leading from a point near Juniper Lake by McKenzie's pond to the Pinehurst-Culdee road at a point near Williamson's store, a distance of about three miles. This road is used as an R. F. D. route and as a school bus route.

The board also voted to recommend to the judge, the solicitor and the clerk of the Recorder's Court that the court proceed immediately to clear up and collect the costs and fines due by defendants under judgments where defendants have been convicted by this court.

It was ordered that the maximum Schedule "B" taxes be levied for Moore county for 1934-35; that the bond of O. D. Sandy, constable for Sandhills township, be approved, and that Nivan Ray, colored, be allowed \$10 per month for support, this order being a continuance of a former order.

Permits for license to sell beer were granted to Kenneth R. Keith and R. G. Gurley in Aberdeen and to Newman Slack in Hemp.

men appointed by the Commissioners are all good men, but this isn't the point. Every person, regardless of politics, will have to repay the money to the Federal Government in one form or another and therefore is entitled to representation, even if that representation is in the minority. It is a reflection on the Board of Commissioners to put politics into a matter dealing with the public welfare, if such it is, and especially with respect to the spending of taxpayer's money. It would seem that the Commissioners either doubted the sincerity of the President or had no respect for his plea for non-partisan action with respect to the expenditure of the public funds.

"It isn't a matter of recognizing some political faction or independent group of voters, but a matter of recognizing that taxpayers still have some rights regardless of their politics. A man may never be successful in his political views but he has civil rights that should not be violated. There is but one way to deal fairly and that is deal fairly. Not to recognize the rights of 2,500 independent tax payers in Moore county with respect to spending their money is a dangerous thing. If this group should refuse to pay any tax because they had no recognition (even minority recognition), the County couldn't exist one year.

"In the words of a well known Moore county man, 'Let's all be honest if we die poor.' I ask that the Commissioners add at least three more names to the committee, these men to come from some place in the county other than Carthage."

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## Sandy Lee Uses Razor to Carve New Face on Benny Porter

**And Gets Six Months To Think It Over.—Other Recorder's Court Happenings**

Sandy Lee Gaines, colored of Pinehurst, emphasized his statement that he was "not afraid of him or any of his family" by picking up a razor in a barber shop in Taylortown and carving a new mouth for Benny Porter, colored, cutting entirely through his jaw. Although he pleaded not guilty before the Recorder on Monday, the judge pronounced him guilty and gave him six months on the roads.

Upon recommendation of Officer Gargis, the solicitor took a nol pros with leave in the case against Paul Waring, white of Southern Pines, charged with illegal possession of liquor.

Hurley McBride, colored of Pinehurst, charged with stealing from the home of Walter Harris a suit case belonging to John McDonald, said suitcase containing McDonald's clothes and personal belongings, and also with buying and transporting liquor, was given a 60-day road sentence, this to be suspended upon payment of a fine of \$25 and the costs and upon condition that he remain of good behavior and violate no law during the next twelve months.

A. B. Maness, white of near McConnell, pleaded guilty of a simple assault upon his brother, A. C. Maness, and was given 30 days on the roads, suspended upon payment of the costs. Curt Kelly, white of near Sanford, pleaded guilty to driving an automobile while intoxicated. He was given a 30-day sentence, suspended on payment of a \$50 fine and the costs and he is not to drive for 90 days.

Sixty days on the roads, suspended upon payment of a fine of \$25 and the costs was the sentence given Cleve Jones, colored of Aberdeen, who was found guilty of possessing liquor and home brew for sale.

Tommie Goode, colored of Southern Pines, charged with striking Sam Funderburk on the head and face with an iron pipe, was given 30 days in jail, suspended upon payment of the costs.

Walter Brown, colored of Pinehurst, must be good to his wife and not violate any law for two years and pay the costs of the case if he wants to

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and learned societies. He was an honorary D. C. L. of Oxford, and honorary D. Sc. of Cambridge and Dublin Universities, an associate of the Royal Astronomical Society, foreign member of the Royal Society which awarded him the Copley Medal in 1890, and associate of the French Institute. The inclusion of Simon Newcomb in the Hall of Fame of New York University would be a merited recognition of a leading American scientist.

In addition to numerous degrees and honors of American and foreign universities and societies, Congress passed a special act permitting him to become an Officer of the Legion of Honor of France, and later another act allowing him to accept the award made by the German Emperor of Foreign Knight in the Order: "Pour le merite fur Wissenschaften und Kunst." He was also honored by the Russian government, and his portrait hangs in the Pulkova Observatory in Russia, as well as in Johns Hopkins University, the American Philosophical Society in Philadelphia and the National Museum in Washington.

Born in Nova Scotia

Simon Newcomb was born at Wallace, Nova Scotia, on March 12, 1835 and came to the United States in 1853. He was a professor of mathematics in the U. S. Navy and commissioned a rear admiral in 1906. He died in Washington July 11, 1909. If he is elected to the Hall of Fame he will be the first mathematician so honored, and only the sixth scientist.

A monument in honor of Mr. Newcomb is soon to be unveiled at his birthplace in Nova Scotia, erected by the Government of Canada. This is the first time in history that anyone whose life work was done outside of Canada has been so honored.

Frederick Law Olmstead is nominated as an outstanding landscape architect. He played a large part in the laying out of the village of Pinehurst and it environs. Elisha Kent Kane was a noted Arctic explorer whose descendants have long made Southern Pines a winter residence.

There is also further local interest in the elections to the Hall of Fame in that Struthers Burt, Southern Pines author, is a member of the Board of Electors who pass upon the final selections, as is Walter Lippmann, contributing editor of The Pilot.

## Vass-Lakeview Gets Agriculture Teacher

**Money Appropriated by State and County for Reestablishment of Course**

Money has been appropriated by both the State and county for an agriculture teacher for the Vass-Lakeview High School for the coming school year, according to announcement made this week by the county superintendent of schools. Vass-Lakeview was chosen as the school to receive this work because of the fact that it already has the equipment, having had an agricultural department for several years before it was discontinued two years ago, and because the school is very anxious to continue the work.

It is hoped that home economics may be established in several of the schools. One home economics teacher has already been promised by the State for Cameron and Pinehurst is to have a commercial teacher, supported by the State, county and district.

Hemp and Pinehurst schools, which have supported their own home economics departments for the past two or three years by private contributions, will this year receive aid from the county. The county will pay one-half the salary of home economics teachers at West End, Aberdeen and Eureka if these communities will raise the remainder of the salaries.

In Carthage, the home economics teacher is charged up to the regular number of state allotted teacher, this teacher doing home economics work instead of teaching other high school subjects.

## \$62,528 Is Cameron Dewberry Estimate

**Market Closes With Sales of Around 31,264 Crates at \$2.00 Average**

The last dewberries went from Cameron last Thursday by express. During the season there were 25,475 crates sold there over the auction block, bringing an average price of \$2.09. Express shipments totalled 456; refrigerator cars totaled 3,839, and shipments of berries on privately owned trucks were at least 1,500, bringing a total of 31,264 crates. While it is impossible to get an accurate average of berries shipped by rail and on privately owned trucks, it is safe to assume that the entire average for the season must have been around \$2.00 per crate. This therefore would mean there was an income of \$62,528.00 for the month to Cameron and community. While the larger farms paid very little profit to their owners, the small farms, operated by the farmer and his family, bring in more profit through dewberries than through any other crop that could be raised at this season of the year.

## Favors Local Option For Liquor Control

**"Sandy" Graham, Candidate for Governor, Puts Wet Plank in Platform**

Lieut. Gov. A. H. (Sandy) Graham, Hillsboro, candidate for Governor, has come out for local option liquor control and elimination of the sales tax on the bare necessities of life in a statement issued last week. "At the next regular session of the State Legislature I favor enactment of a State alcoholic control system, based upon the principle of local option, so that the voters of every county may have the opportunity of expressing their views on this question," he said. Liquor stores should be operated "only in those counties where a majority of the voters have expressed themselves as favoring this method of handling the sales of whiskey. I feel that such a Statewide plan would be a forward step in bettering existing conditions. General conditions are certainly not satisfactory at the present, and I strongly favor taking steps to remedy this situation."

"Saying this would bring large revenue," he said that this revenue should be used "for removal of the sales tax now levied on foods and the bare necessities of life. It would also permit a substantial reduction of the present rate," said Mr. Graham.
