STATE HIGHWAY PATROL BUSY DURING PAST MONTH

The State Highway Patroy in June arrested 809 persons, 107 for drunken driving, convicted 678 who received 11 years and two months in sentences, and 18 were found not guilty, Captain C. D. Farmer reports. In the month the patrol inspected 3,214 vehicles, corrected 6,340 pairs of lights and issued warnings to 3,329 motorists. Property valued at \$15,074.47 was recovered; traffic violators were fined \$8,694.23 and court costs were \$5,637.85, while revenues collected amounted to \$32,475.41, a total of \$61,881.96, the report shows.
