SMITH, FOUND GUILTY OF ASSAULT, APPEALS CASE

No probable cause for commission of a felony was found in the case of Nathan Smith, colored, who was last week brought to the county from Knightdale to face a charge of secret assault with a deadly weapon upon Mr. Hough of Hill Crest with intent to rob. He was found guilty of an assault with deadly weapon and given 60 days on the roads, suspended upon payment of a \$10 fine and the costs. He gave notice of appeal and bond was fixed at \$100.

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
