### Diary Reveals Civil War Tales of Butler and Olmsted Forbears

Namesakes of Young Friends Here Were Friends in Arms 73 Years Ago

Cyrus Butler and Warren Olmsted are friends. They were young boys in the Southern Pines school only a few years ago. They are only young men now. Cyrus is a chemist making yarn for Eastman, Warren a lawyer of Carthage. Cyrus Butler and Warren Olmsted were also friends 75 years ago. An old diary of Civil War days tells of the first friendship. The book belonged to Lt. Col. Butler and the yellowed pages relate their movements while members of Company K, of the 11th regiment of the Pennsylvania Volunteers.
