the Governor and the other speakers eulogized President Roosevelt and declared that the disapproval of the North Carolina's applications was not his fault. The blame was placed on "underlings" in Washington.

When the critical situation had been explained in detail, the meeting approved unanimously a motion

to appoint a committee, composed of Governor Ehringhaus, Senators Bailey and Reynolds, and Congressman Doughton, to go to Washington, interview the proper authorities, and see to it that North Carolina got a square deal in the distribution of the public works fund.

A number of Moore county projects, including school and hospital programs, are included in those held up in Washington.
