

Exercises Open School Season in Carthage

Large Enrollment on Opening Day Monday; Twenty Teachers on Faculty

The Carthage elementary and high schools opened Monday morning for the 1935-36 session with appropriate exercises in the high school auditorium. Superintendent O. B. Welch presided. The devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. T. Sloan Guy.

H. Lee Thomas, superintendent of county schools, was the speaker. His subject was "What Makes a Successful Student." Listing as most important and valuable character traits in the development of the individual students as, obedience, honesty, industry, loyalty to school, the speaker defined, each and concluded with a summary of these objections of public education assuring his audience that an effort to develop these character traits would make the school proud of its investment.

Superintendent Welch gave a short outline of the year's work and explained the book rental system.

The enrollment for the first day was a large one. The school this year has six high school teachers and 14 elementary teachers. R. B. Hardy of Birmingham, Ala., has been elected to fill the place of F. Y. Blanton as Science teacher and athletic coach.
