Drunken Driving Leads
Recorder Court CasesColored Lad Steals Clock From
Automobile; Lloyd Fry
Gets 50 Days

David Allen, colored boy of Pinehurst, wanted time, wanted it badly enough to steal it, but he didn't care for as much as three months, especially when there was a job on the roads thrown in for good measure. S. E. Decker asked the boy to go with him in his car to show him the way to the home of some friends, and when Decker returned to his automobile, he found that the clock had been stolen from it.

Ed Briggs, colored of Aberdeen, was in court charged with failure to support his wife and five children. But when the wife got on the witness stand, instead of making the complaints which she had enumerated on the warrant, she pretended that everything was fine and dandy. The court found that the prosecution was frivolous and malicious and taxed Mamie Briggs with the costs. Upon her failure to pay the costs, the judge gave her ten days in jail.

Earl Crawford, white of near Carthage, was given 30-days for drunken driving, this to be suspended upon payment of a fine of \$50 and the costs. He is not to drive for 90 days.

Major Marshall, colored, was serving a five months sentence at the county home, but he made the mistake of getting drunk, so he must serve his remaining three months and an additional month on the State highways.

Phil Missig, white, charged with drunken, careless and reckless driving in Aberdeen, was given 60 days on the roads, suspended upon payment of a fine of \$50 and the costs.

Wilbert Davis, colored of Aberdeen, was found guilty of possessing liquor for sale and transporting. He was given a two-months sentence, suspended upon payment of \$25 and the costs, and the sheriff was ordered to destroy the two and one-half pints of liquor.

Carl Ingram, colored of High Point, who ran his car into a ditch near Carthage, was found guilty of drunken driving and given a 30-day sentence, suspended upon payment of a \$50 fine and the costs, and his driver's license was revoked for 90 days.

Sam Marshall, white of Aberdeen, was in court charged with an assault on a female and drunken driving. This being a violation of the terms of a sentence suspended since March, he must serve the 60 days imposed at that time.

Rufus Wooten, colored of Carthage, was sentenced to serve four months on the roads on charges of simple assault, assault on a female and trespass. He gave notice of appeal and bond was fixed at \$200.

Clem Baldwin, colored of Carthage, had his 30-day sentence for public drunkenness suspended upon payment of the costs and upon condition that he be of good behavior for twelve months.

Lloyd Fry, white of near Carthage, was ordered sent to the roads for 50 days, 30 for public drunkenness and 20 on a former case in which he had failed to meet the conditions upon which it was suspended.

Two Seriously Injured
in Automobile WreckAccident on Old Plank Road
Near Hemp Sends Pair
to Hospital

Burney West of Hemp and Herbert Kennedy, whose home is in Cumnock but who owns a considerable amount of property in Hemp and for the past while has been working there, were seriously injured in an automobile accident on the Old Plank Road about four miles above Hemp during the week-end. The car, a comparatively new Plymouth, was almost demolished.

West, who was at the wheels, is said to have driven the car around a barricade and onto a newly oiled

section of the road, lost control, the car turning over several times, tearing down several trees, it is said. One cedar tree with a trunk about the size of an ordinary man's body was uprooted and broken off about ten feet from the ground.

West sustained a crushed shoulder and broken collarbone. Kennedy was thrown through the metal top of the car. Both men were rushed to the Moore County Hospital for treatment. The speedometer of the car was stuck at 80 miles when it finally ceased its wild dash.
