Congressman Lambeth Praises AAA, Purchasing Power and Live-at-Home Program

He gave as the causes of collapse of agriculture the tremendous surplus, the debt situation, the high interest rate and the high tariff policy of the country for a great many years.

The change in the last three years has been due to the AAA program reducing the farm surplus, the purchasing power of the farmer, and the live-at-home program.
