WHAT'S BEHIND DEMAND FOR SOCIAL SESSION?

Lieutenant Governor A. H. (Sandy) Graham came out with a statement to the effect that public sentiment seems to demand a special session of the General Assembly to enact legislation to take advantage of the national plan for unemployment insurance and old age pensions.

Dr. Ralph W. McDonald, his opponent for the Democratic nomination for governor, hastened to congratulate him on his statement and added he thought a special session imperative.

To all of which Governor Ehringhaus responded that it is sometimes harder to resist the popular clamor and hold out for the best interests of the state than it is to go along with it and follow the lines of least resistance.

It is true that there is a lot of selfishness connected with demands now being made for the special session. Not that Mr. Graham is selfish in desiring to come into public notice while a candidate, nor that Dr. McDonald is seeking a selfish end in wanting to have an opportunity to further his candidacy.

Some want it primarily to try to repeal the sales tax law. Still others have this or that pet scheme to try to further. Even the newspapers, especially those in Raleigh, would naturally benefit by the session.

All of this Governor Ehringhaus knows and is quick to put his finger on the real reason va-
