

## NEW SANITARUM OPENS TO TREAT MENTAL DISEASES

**Drs. Kemp and Boseman, Both Carolinians, Take Possession of Pinebluff Inn**

### REGARD LOCATION IDEAL

Following up the unconfirmed report in last week's Pilot, Drs. Malcolm D. Kemp and Claude A. Boseman this week announced the opening on Wednesday of The Pinebluff Sanitarium in the Pinebluff Inn for the treatment of nervous and mental diseases, alcoholism and drug addiction.

The Pinebluff Inn was selected because of the climate of this section, the natural beauty and the quiet and peaceful aspect of the location, the physicians announced. Only mild mental cases will be accepted and since quiet and seclusion are so necessary a part of psychiatric treatment, the physicians feel that such an institution will in no sense detract from the desirable qualities of the locality. The sanitarium will be for private patients.

Dr. Kemp and Dr. Boseman are both North Carolinians. Dr. Kemp's home being in Elizabethtown, and Dr. Boseman's in Enfield. Both are graduates of the University of North Carolina. Dr. Kemp received his medical degree from Washington University School of Medicine, and Dr. Boseman from the University of Pennsylvania. Since serving their internship both have been connected with various psychiatric hospitals in New York and Baltimore. They have recently been associated with the psychiatric department of the Johns Hopkins Hospital.

Both the doctors feel that such an institution for the treatment of nervousness is needed in Eastern Carolina, there being no such institution nearer than Greensboro. The last few years have witnessed a great interest in the general question of mental hygiene. The question of early treatment of nervousness is as important, the doctors feel, as the early treatment of tuberculosis. Much suffering and long continued treatments can be avoided by early treatment. The interest in mental hygiene has been evidenced by numerous mental hygiene clinics, child guidance clinics and various psychiatric institutions. Much can be done for the cure of mental or nervous illness in psychotherapy, occupational therapy, hydrotherapy and in certain cases of psychoanalyses.

Dr. Boseman and Dr. Kemp are anxious not only to establish a successful sanitarium but to contribute something to the life of the community along the general lines of mental hygiene. Parent-Teachers' Associations, clubs or other organizations will find them eager to contribute whatever they can in this very important question of healthful mental hygiene.

### At Last!

**A Physician Finally Comes to the Aid of Doctorless Cameron**

Cameron has a doctor once more after eight months without medical aid.

Since April, 1934, the little town has been without a physician, despite an appeal to the American Council on Medical Education which grew out of a statement lamenting the "surplus of new doctors."

Dr. Charles N. Eckerson, 24-year old native of Charleston, W. Va., heard of Cameron's need through a letter written to Dr. William D. Cutter, Chicago, secretary of the council. He decided to answer the appeal, and hung out his shingle this week.

The letter to Dr. Cutter, written by Mrs. J. M. Guthrie of Cameron, received wide-spread publicity because of the unusual appeal.

"We have written to hospitals, to the State Medical Board, and we have advertised in state papers," Mrs. Guthrie wrote. "we have asked traveling salesmen of drugs and other doctors to be on the lookout. We have had two nibbles, and both country practice.

"We have tried every way we know to get a physician. It is a delight to turn the problem over to a man who knows where the 'excess production of doctors' is located."

Dr. Eckerson, recent medical school graduate, was delayed in answering Cameron's call for medical aid while he underwent an appendectomy.

Circle No. 1 of the Methodist Missionary Society will give a "Conversation Party" next Tuesday afternoon

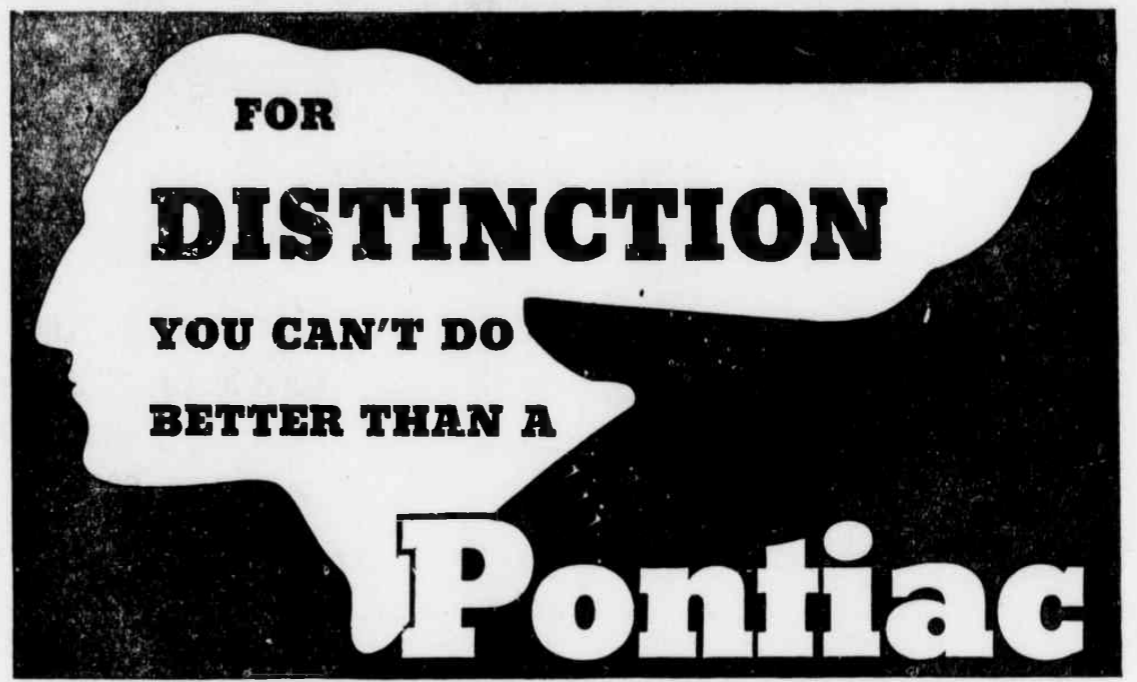

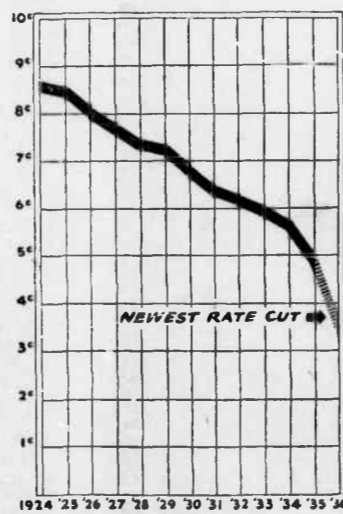
