Following up the unconfirmed report in last week's Pilot, Drs. Malcolm D. Kemp and Claude A. Boseman this week announced the opening on Wednesday of The Pinebluff Sanitarium in the Pinebluff Inn for the treatment of nervous and mental diseases, alcoholism and drug addic-

The Pinebluff Inn was selected because of the climate of this section, the natural beauty and the quiet and peaceful aspect of the location, the physicians announced. Only mild 10:00 a. m. mental cases will be accepted and since quiet and seclusion are so necessary a part of psychiatric treatment, Rev the physicians feel that such an institution will in no sense detract from the desirable qualities of the locality. 




