Norfolk Youngsters Are Apprehended, However, and Land in Recorder's Court

Russell and John Farrow, brothers; William Reed, alias Bill Gentry, and James Barbour, alias Bill Johnson, white boys of Norfolk ranging in age from 12 to around 17 years, found school life growing monotonous and Norfolk lacking in interest, so they decided a few days ago to "take a trip." Without consulting their parents, they ste out late in the week, journeying southward.

On Sunday before last, the blustery day which followed a night of rain and wind, the lads reached Vass. By that time their shoes were much the worse for wear, and as they wandered around the town, they sighted several pairs of perfectly good looking shoes inside a window of Beasley's Department Store, and the big glass window was temptingly cracked.

R. P. Beasley, owner of the store, also owns a roadside station known as Carolina Inn, located several miles south of Vass on Highway 1. He was there when four boys passed by, carrying new shoes which were unwrapped.

Upon returning to his place in Vass Mr. Beasley saw that shoes were missing from his store window, so within a short time he got in touch with an officer and they caught up with the boys and gave them a lift, in the opposite direction from which they were traveling. They were lodged in the county jail and their parents were notified.

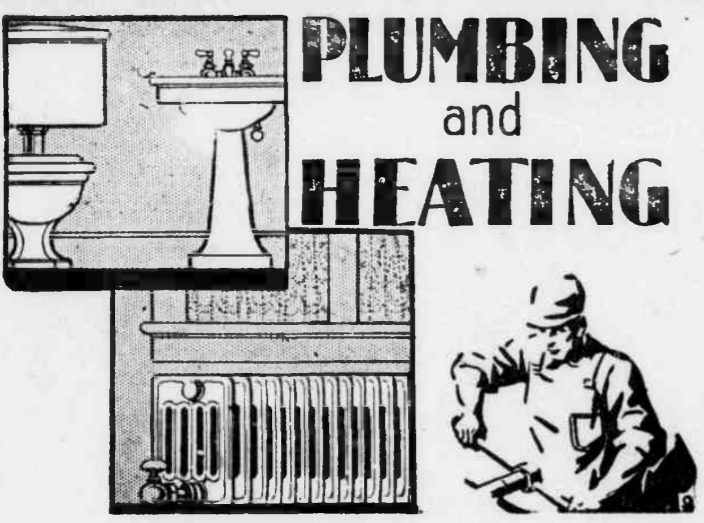
