To Reopen Clinics For Special Treatment

Support of Community Asked for Continuance of Important Work Here

At a meeting held at the home of Mrs. E. T. Chapman in Southern Pines on Monday plans were discussed for the reopening of the clinic so successfully operated last spring by Dr. J. Symington, County Health Officer, and financed by the Red Cross. Without any kind of publicity at all, so that many people in town had no idea of its existence, the clinic proved very useful. Its usefulness was too soon cut short by lack of funds. If it is to be reopened to carry on its useful service it must have the attention and the support of the whole community.

It is not proposed to attempt to operate a general clinic but only to make possible the continuance of the same sort of work done last year, that is the treatment of chronic cases of Vincent's angina and venereal diseases. The existence of chronic cases of these diseases constitute a serious menace to any community. Nothing can be gained by ignoring or denying the existence of such a menace. The only course is to work to remove it. This such a clinic can do. By treatment of these diseases it is possible to effect cures and to limit the spread of infection. The treatment of Vincent's angina is a helpful preventative of tuberculosis which so often follows upon the angina.

The group of people interested in furthering this useful work hope that when they are ready to put a definite plan before the community they will be an immediate and generous response. There should be for it is a community problem and responsibility.

"The Voice of Bugle Ann," the attraction at the Pinehurst Theatre, Monday, February 10th, matinee and night, is based on a current literary sensation written by Mackinley Kantor. The character of the story, its deep human interest theme, will result in the picture coming into wide popular favor. The story is that of a man and his dog—his great love for it and the dog's devotion to his master. Yet it is not an ordinary dog story, rather one in which the various elements of romance, drama and light contrasting comedy touch the deepest human sentiments. Completely out of the groove story idea, "The Voice of Bugle Ann" is completely American in tone. The locale is the upland country of Missouri and Kansas. Among the spectacular action features are several incidents colorfully portraying fox hunting. Importance attached to the appeal of the story is reflected in the selection of the cast. "The Lady Consents" is the second screen alliance of Miss Harding and the popular English actor, Herbert Marshall. Understood to be sophisticated comedy highlighted with serious drama, the picture should present both players at their most entertaining. Marshall appears as a young society doctor and Miss Harding as the wife who lets him slip through her fingers, Margaret Lindsay plays the other woman and Walter Abel is in another supporting role. The different twist on the marital triangle upon which the entertainment is based will reveal a new and effective method for wives to employ in combating the inroads of attractive and designing women upon their domestic preserves.

"It Had to Happen," at Pinehurst Friday, February 14th, matinee and night, is a comedy-drama built on a popular semi-topical theme and is based on a story, "Canavan," by Rupert Hughes whose screen yarns of American Life are familiar. It is the story of an Italian who comes to America and rises from the obscurity of crowded tenements to a position of power and wealth in New York's political, financial and social life. The locales run from the slums to Park Avenue with a side trip to the Saratoga races, life in all quarters being humanly reflected. Though George Raft and Rosalind Russell are starred, there is also an excellent supporting cast. In particular there is the teaming of Raft and Leo Carrillo. "It Had to Happen" is humorous, dramatic and romantic, and should furnish a very pleasant evening's entertainment.

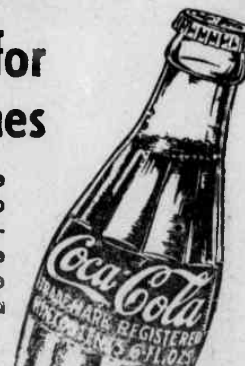
