

Medical Fund For County Poor Needed

Money Sought to Provide Indigent Families With Care and Medicine

An appeal is being made through the county papers for money with which to establish a Medical Fund for the Welfare Department of Moore county.

Mrs. W. Gilliam Brown, County Superintendent of Public Welfare, is often put to it to secure medical attention and medicines for people who can get along fairly well until an emergency, such as illness in the family, arises, but have no resources upon which to draw in such an emergency.

For instance, three members of a family near Pinehurst were stricken with pneumonia and had no money with which to get a doctor. Between Pinehurst and Carthage, in a family of six, the mother was narrowly saved from pneumonia by aid of the Welfare department. These cases are only two of many.

The County Health Officer is not allowed to do private practice and it would take a very full county treasury to take care of all such cases. Other physicians have been most cooperative. One ventured out on a country road, stuck in the mud bringing the already high cost of transportation to a neat sum. It is easy to see that a way must be provided to pay at least a nominal fee, plus medicines.

COUNTY VOTES \$1,500 FOR NEEDED SCHOOL REPAIRS

Recorder's Court

Black, White, is Feeling Blue; He Did Things That He Shouldn't Do

Thad Black, white of Eastwood, on Monday in Recorder's Court entered a plea of guilty to charges of public drunkenness, disorderly conduct and unlawful possession of liquor. He was given a 30-day road sentence to begin at the expiration of a three months' sentence imposed in a former case.

Boulah Jones, colored of Aberdeen, was found guilty of the unlawful possession of liquor. Her 30-day sentence was suspended upon her paying \$20 down and promising to pay \$5 a week until the remainder of the bill is paid.

George McCoy's 60-day road sentence imposed for possessing and selling liquor to be suspended upon the payment of a fine of \$25 and the costs. McCoy is a colored man of Aberdeen.

Cleveland Hughes, colored of Aberdeen, pleaded guilty of driving a motor vehicle while intoxicated. He was given sixty days on the roads, suspended upon payment of a fine of \$50 and the costs, and he is not to drive for 90 days.

Amos Howell, white of Vass, was found guilty of an assault on A. R. Laubscher with a deadly weapon, but not guilty of public drunkenness. He was sentenced to serve three months on the roads. Notice of appeal to Superior Court was given and bond was fixed at \$250.

It appearing that Callie Mashburn is insane and that efforts are being made to get her in an asylum, the State took a nol pros with leave in an assault charge.

A nol pros with leave was taken in the case of Eugene Ray, colored of Aberdeen, who was charged with taking \$2.75 from the person of James McNeill.




