Will Be Assisted on Program by String Ensemble of Southern Pines Music Society

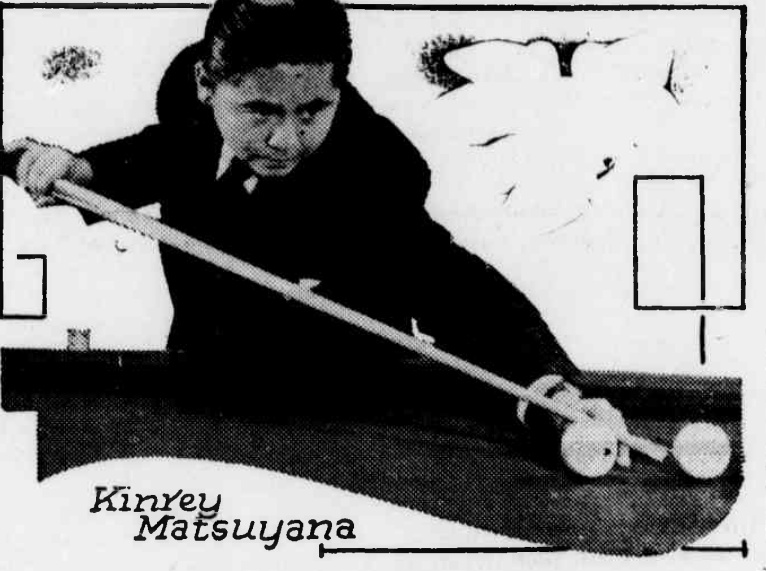

fish hatchery, the Sandhills development program includes an 80-mile system of fire lanes and truck trails, telephone lines, lookout towers, an extensive 4-H club encampment layout and a recreation center providing year-around vacation facilities on U. S. Highway No. 1, which traverses the heart of the project area.

The Sandhills project is regarded by Resettlement officials as an outstanding demonstration of how land which never should have been used for any form of agriculture can be turned into uses which will make the region an asset to the state and nation.
