For forty years Flora Macdonald College has enjoyed an enviable reputation and great popularity in the Carolinas and beyond their borders. It was founded in 1896 by Fayetteville Presbytery as Red Springs Seminary. Orange and Wilmington Presbyteries later joined in its support. Under the lable leadership of Dr. Charles G. Vardell, it has developed into a senior "A" grade college.

The four thousand alumnae living in the Carolinas, other states and foreign lands occupy positions of usefulness and leadership in the religious, social, business and educational life of the people. Flora Macdonald College has been preeminently successful in preparing young women for useful and happy lives. The present student body, numbering 315, is drawn from twelve states and three foreign countries.

The faculty consists of eighteen well qualified professors in the academic departments and five in the school of music. These teachers enjoy unusual reputation for thoroughness in their instructions. All teaching is done by full professors.

The college offers courses leading to the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music, and Bachelor of Science (in Home Economics) degrees. Commercial and secretarial training are also offered. An educational leader recently said that the educators of North Carolina appreciate Flora Macdonald College because it does thoroughly what it undertakes to do.

Provision is made for the social life of the students. All may entertain their friends at the college and participate in public receptions and teas besides the various student social occasions. Students and teachers mingle freely. The college life is very much like that of a great happy fam-

Two literary societies conducted by the students offer opportunities for many forms of literary activity and training in parliamentary practice and public speaking. Many leaders in women's religious organizations, federated clubs and other organized activities for women, were trained at Flora Macdonald College.

More than 4,000 young women have attended Flora Macdonald College, a large proportion of whom have graduated. They have made splendid records in graduate courses and in the work of the world. The curriculum of the College of Liberal Arts leads to the Bachelor of Arts degree in Home Economics.
